CONFERENCES, MEETINGS & TRAINING

Master Planning Meetings: On May 7, 12 and 13, Director Metanchuk took part in planning meetings for the District's next master plan, the 2035 Plan, with Director of Planning & Land Protection Jennifer Rooks-Lopez, Director of Finance David Petschke, and Executive Director Ben Haberthur. On May 12, the group met with J Blue of SmithGroup to review formatting of the forthcoming plan. The 2035 Plan has been delayed to incorporate the impact of the successful 2024 Land Acquisition & Preserve Improvement Referendum. In the interim, Director Metanchuk prepared the 2026 Update: 2015 Comprehensive Master Plan. It reflects current financials and priority projects.

IN-PERSON PROGRAMS

 Public Programs – As an extension of the Creek Bend Nature Center traveling fly-fishing exhibit, we've worked with Trout Unlimited to offer four Fly-tying Workshops. At the final session in May, attendees learned to design and create the perfect fly for their next fishing adventure and took home at least four different flies.



Fly-fishing, and fly tying, is for all ages. These young men were very excited to attend the workshop, and left with some beautifully tied flies and tips for using them on our local waterways.

Eighteen mothers, and those celebrating moms, joined Naturalist Ross for a *Mother's Day Wildflower Walk* at Bliss Woods Forest Preserve in Sugar Grove. She shared intriguing stories about the various wildflowers and launched a wildflower scavenger hunt.

Along with consulting mycologist Crystal McAllister, Environmental Education Manager McKittrick co-led the first mushroom foray of the season for the Kane County Mushroom Monitors. Monitors gathered at LeRoy Oakes Forest Preserve in St. Charles to search out and identify mushrooms emerging within the woodlands and grasslands. This learning experience is conducted three times per year to increase the monitors' knowledgebase and to generate excitement for our successful monitoring program!



After collecting specimens under our scientific collecting permit authority, Illinois Mycology Association members Crystal McAllister and Barb McKittrick identified species based on their identifying characteristics, habitats and substrate.

During the Amphibian Adventure, Naturalist Lemon showed attendees first-hand how animals that live both in the water and on land are very unique and interesting creatures! She introduced folks to the amphibians that call Illinois home and explained their special adaptions while the group used dip nets to explore the pond and creek for frogs, toads, and salamanders.

In other water-based programming, Naturalist O'Brien got 12 patrons into Ferson Creek at LeRoy Oakes Forest Preserve for a *Welcome to your Watershed* event. She explained that we all live in a watershed and what each of us does in our homes and communities impacts our neighbors and the animals that

depend on aquatic habitats to survive. Then, during the creek exploration, the group investigated the health of the waterway and found many mussels and crayfish.

To attract return patrons and build a loyal following of citizen conservationists, we offer several series of programs that meet on a recurring basis. All are popular, and together this suite of serial programs serves a wide range of target audiences:

- Bird Watching Walks: Naturalist Josh Libman's monthly walks celebrate the changing seasons as he
 leads patrons on a hike to look and listen for birds and covers basic bird-identification skills. In May,
 19 attendees joined him at Burlington Prairie Forest Preserve in Sycamore.
- Senior Stroll: Started decades ago, this is one of our longest-running public programs and it draws a
 large and devoted group of active adults. This month, Naturalist Libman welcomed 35 attendees to
 Muirhead Spring Forest Preserve in Hampshire for a stroll to learn about flower structures and seed
 heads.
- Yarn Art: Naturalist Lemon invites crafters of all ages to bring their own yarn art project to work within a group of fellow yarn enthusiasts at Creek Bend Nature Center. This month, 18 fiber artists joined the circle.
- StoryTime at Creek Bend Nature Center: Every month, our patrons join a librarian from the
 St. Charles Public Library for read-aloud stories, finger plays, and songs, staying to enjoy the
 interactive exhibits in the Nature Center following the program. We welcomed 43 folks in May.
- Little Saplings: This monthly program, developed for 3-5 year olds by Naturalist Lisa O'Brien, explores seasonal themes in the natural world using a combination of stories, nature hikes, songs, games, and/or crafts. For May's Damsels to Dragons theme, eight children and their adults learned about Odonates, made a dragonfly craft and went on an insect hunt at LeRoy Oakes Forest Preserve.
- Nurtured by Nature: Naturalist O'Brien invites adults to experience the healing effects of nature. During this monthly series, she incorporates gentle stretching, deep breathing and a focus on awareness during hikes designed to nurture the mind, body and spirit. May's program at Johnson's Mound Forest Preserve in Elburn drew 19 patrons.
- Trek with a Naturalist: Environmental Education Manager McKittrick designs and leads this monthly program for those who like active hiking, all year long. We visit different preserves each month, with May's being Tekakwitha Woods Forest Preserve in St. Charles. The 28 trekkers were treated to an ephemeral wildflower show during the 3.5-mile, fast-paced hike.

The 2025 kayaking season kicked off with a *Learn to Kayak* paddling-skills class at Oakhurst Forest Preserve in Aurora. This beginner, lake-based program focused on learning paddling techniques on dry land, prior to hitting the water to practice these skills and build confidence. Certified instructors from our partner agency, Rocktown Adventures, led the skills portion of the program and Environmental Education Manager McKittrick led the naturalist-guided tour around Lake Patterson. We were thrilled to have Commissioner Myrna Molina and her daughter join us!

• Community & Outreach Programs – A significant portion of the naturalist team's efforts involve traveling to and educating community groups, school classes and partner-library patrons. Community programs are given at or for private organizations like garden clubs, service organizations, church groups, private school/day care centers and senior centers. In May, Naturalist Libman held Birdwatching Walks for the St. Charles Environmental Commission (at Tekakwitha Woods Forest Preserve) and the Sun City Bird Watching Club (at Rutland Forest Preserve.) Naturalist Ross welcomed 12 Northern Illinois Special Recreation Association (NISRA) adults to Brunner Family Forest Preserve in Dundee for a Regenerative

Agriculture program. This community really enjoyed learning the differences between regenerative and traditional agriculture and seeing the dairy cows, including several baby calves, move from the barn to the pasture. One participant said happily, "This is the best day ever!"

- Outreach programs are given at public schools, day care centers and libraries. We presented to 338 county residents this month, including Naturalist Ross's table at the Veterans Resource Fair at the Batavia VFW; Naturalist Ross, O'Brien's and Lemon's *Traveling Naturalist: Wonderful World of Insects* programs at Howard B. Thomas Elementary School (D301) and Otter Creek Elementary School (U46); and Environmental Education Manager McKittrick's *Witness Trees of Illinois* presentation at the Batavia Public Library.
- School Programs Spring is a busy time for school groups to take field trips to our forest preserves and spend time learning from naturalists in the field. In May, we hosted seven school field trips for a total of 491 students. Schools visiting included Howard B. Thomas Elementary (D301), Alice Gustafson and Grace McWayne Elementary (D101), Lincoln Prairie Elementary (D300), Fred Rodgers Elementary (D131), and Richmond and Wasco Elementary (D303) schools. We hosted them at Oakhurst and LeRoy Oakes Forest Preserves. Field trip topics covered included Spring Wildflowers, Discovery Hike, Rivers & Streams, Tracks and Trails, Animal Adaptations and Wonderful World of Insects. Naturalist Libman also welcomed 42 homeschoolers from 2 different homeschool networks to Homeschool Hikes at Schweitzer Woods Forest Preserve in West Dundee and Johnson's Mound Forest Preserve in Elburn.
- Learn from the Experts (LFE)/Kane County Certified Naturalist (KCCN) Programs Our May LFE
 was Fishing the Fox River, taught by Tom Stewart, former Senior Ranger with the District and a
 3rd generation fisherman that grew up along the Fox River in Elgin. Tom shared his knowledge
 about the sport of fishing and secrets for successfully fishing the Fox River with 25 lucky
 patrons at Creek Bend Nature Center.

Members of the KCCN Class of 2026 gathered for their second field trip of the program. Led by Environmental Education Manager McKittrick and Naturalist Libman at Johnson's Mound Forest Preserve, the group enjoyed seeing first-hand the woodland ecosystem they learned about in class over this past winter. This field experience focused on the topics of woodland ecology, tree ID, woodland birds and restoration. Volunteer Stewards Kim Haag, Greg Knipp and Jeff Hedrich joined the program, too, to explain District volunteer workdays.

All KCCN instructors, from the District and our partner agencies St. Charles and Geneva Park Districts, welcomed eligible certificate candidates of the KCCN Class of 2025 to their graduation ceremony at Peck Farm Park.
