Native Plant Sale Prep: It's hard to believe with the cold, December weather, but it's already time to start preparing for the annual Native Plant Sale. Each spring, the Kane Forest Preserve Foundation hosts an online and in-person Native Plant Sale. The sale is a fundraiser but also has the goal to encourage people to incorporate native plants into their home gardens. On Dec. 10, Community Engagement Director Metanchuk met with representatives from one of our local nurseries to prep for the 2025 sale. Online orders will begin in February, ahead of the May 3 order pickup & in-person sale.

KANE COUNTY

District History: As part of the District's Centennial in 2025, the District has hired a consultant to research the Forest Preserve District's first 100 years. Director Metanchuk met with Consultant Al Watts On Dec. 19, at District headquarters, to discuss progress. So far, the first of three articles have been drafted for publication in Kane County Magazine. The first, on the District's first five forest preserves, will be published in January. There are also history programs scheduled for Jan. 8 at Creek Bend Nature Center and Jan. 14 at the Barbara Belding Lodge at Brewster Creek Forest Preserve. Both programs are 6:30-8 p.m. Registration is \$10 per person. Consultant Watts is currently Celebrating 100 Years working on creating a historic timeline to be added to the District's website. He's also working with District staff to create a history exhibit to be unveiled in June.



WEBSITE & EMAIL

The District has been approved by the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) for a government-level domain (.gov). A .gov domain provides increased trust for the public, can improve security and reduce the risk of fraudulent websites and communications impersonating government sources, and better visibility via search engines. District staff have begun the process of working with County I.T. and the District's web host to convert the website and email to the .gov domain. There will be an advance public relations campaign to make residents aware of the changeover, in early 2025.

Environmental Education

December Spotlight

The Environmental Education staff conducted a very enlightening site visit and brainstorming session at the Urban Ecology Center in Milwaukee. We met with the Center's vice president of ecology & education, vice president of community engagement and director of environmental education. The purpose of this visit was to benchmark best practices and share site and programming ideas in advance of the District's own Urban Ecology Field Station in Aurora, a project put forth as part of the referendum package.



The nationally-renowned Urban Ecology Center in Riverside Park, like the planned FPDKC Urban Ecology Field Station, sits within a densely populated community and provides nature programming and events for underserved populations.

In-Person Programs

PUBLIC PROGRAMS: In what has become a popular and highly anticipated annual event, the entire naturalist staff hosted the *Senior Stroll* holiday celebration at the Barbara Belding Lodge at Brewster Creek Forest Preserve in St. Charles. With nature-themed games and food, seniors enjoyed each other's company and participated in a highly competitive game of Nature Jeopardy!

Forest Preserve in St. Charles. A dozen participants explored the new interpretive trails and learned about the resident beaver dam.

Nine birders turned out to Fox River Shores Forest Preserve in Carpentersville for Naturalist Libman's monthly Bird Watching walk. During the faster-paced Trek with a Naturalist monthly program, **Environmental Education** Manager Barb McKittrick welcomed over 30 patrons to Fabyan Forest Preserve in Geneva. The lively group hiked nearly four miles while learning about the cultural history of the land and the story of the Fabyans.

Naturalist Lisa O'Brien welcomed preschoolers and their caregivers to a *Playful Penguins - Little Saplings* program at LeRoy Oakes Forest Preserve. The little ones were disappointed not to find any penguins in the Creek Bend pond!

While people can put on coats, hats and gloves to keep warm during snowy Midwestern winter, Illinois mammals have to beat the cold in creative ways. Naturalist Erica Lemon explained the special adaptations that help wildlife survive the harsh winter environment during a *Mammals in Winter* hike at Hampshire Forest Preserve.

The final three public programs of 2025 are full to capacity with waiting lists: *Owl Prowl* at Burnidge Forest Preserve in Elgin (30 patrons), *Hike into the New Year* at Johnson's Mound Forest Preserve in Elburn (40 registrants) and *Winter Solstice & Coffee Stroll* at Fabyan Forest Preserve (25 patrons.)

Community, Outreach & Scout Programs

Over 70 Kensington School students (at campuses in Geneva and St. Charles) learned about wildlife found in their own neighborhood during *Backyard Wilderness* programs led by Naturalist Lemon.

Northern Illinois Special Recreation Association (NISRA) communities in Crystal Lake and Carpentersville were treated to Naturalist April Ross' bespoke Nature Jeopardy games that wove in trivia about the group's forest preserve visits and programs during the past 12 months.

School Programs

Naturalist Libman hosted the GeoAdventure Club from Wredling Middle School for a joint program with Creek Bend Nature Center and the Durant House Museum. The 20 participants enjoyed a hike with Naturalist Libman before celebrating the holidays in the Durant House Candlelight Open House. Naturalist Libman also welcomed 80 homeschooling members from four networks to Homeschool Hike programs at Fox River Shores, Johnson's Mound, Campton (St. Charles) and Oakhurst Forest Preserve (Aurora). Program themes included Symbiotic Relationships and Discovery Hikes.

Learn from the Experts (LFE)/Kane County Certified Naturalist (KCCN) Programs

Plans progressed for the start of the KCCN Class of 2025, which kicks off on January 9th. The class is completely full, with 39 registrants and a waiting list.

Environmental Education Manager McKittrick taught a sold-out audience of 35 folks about the history and cultural importance of *Witness Trees* during an LFE at Creek Bend Nature Center. She gave attendees the tools needed and then encouraged them to go out and find witness tress in Kane County.

Nature, Virtually Everywhere! Online Programs

For patrons that can't come to the forest preserves, or choose not to gather in groups, the Environmental Education team continues its innovative work to bring high-quality nature programs to folks via live virtual hikes, videos, and webinars. In December, look for a peek into the secret lives of beavers.
